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SECTION B: READING COMPREHENSION (71/2 MARKS)

Read the following passage and answer the questions on it

"I paid a man 350 German marks to go to Greece since I had no papers. Instead, he brought me to Greece and sold me to a bar. He told me he would kill me if I left. We could not leave the house. There were twelve women, all of us from 15-20 years old. We slept with many men, ten men a day. We were beaten if we tried to leave. The police came and arrested all of us women and brought us to a small prison. I spent four months in prison, after that I went to court. Because I did not have papers, the court gave me three months (suspended sentence) and immediate deportation and told me I could not return to Greece for five years."

This is the human reality of the trafficking of women and girls. It's a shocking trade that destroys the lives of its victims. But it's a massive source of revenue for traffickers, and they have been quick to exploit women in poorer countries. They promise jobs with decent money, a better life and a chance to send money back home to feed their families. They deliver a "career" in the sex industry where women are virtually enslaved- their passports taken away; their earnings confiscated to "pay" for their passage. The women may be bought and sold many times. If they are caught, they are often put in prison and sent back home where they will face rejection and shame from their communities.

Traffickers set up elaborate networks of accomplices, from false front employment agencies to passport forgers, truckers in human cargo, new girl display rooms, internet distributors, and lastly, houses of prostitution in the West. The United Nations estimates that the trade is worth some \$7 billion a year. Within Europe, there are several trafficking routes thought to be dominated by organized crime groups. Bosses pay recruiters about \$500 for each new girl and if recruiters are clever about it, it's money easily made.

Traffickers prey upon the vulnerable, the poverty stricken, and they offer tempting rewards; a chance to travel overseas for a good job in a rich country. Some are told they will work in the sex industry but in good conditions, others are promised work as waitresses, cleaners or secretaries. The trafficking industry seeks to exploit inequalities existing between the developed and the developing world and the basic human desire to make our situation better. This is happening all over the world. US government figures suggest that as many as 900,000 people are trafficked every year. Girls from villages in Nepal and Bangladesh are sold to brothels in India. Young women from the Philippines travel to Japan to serve as "entertainers," but later find themselves virtually enslaved by their employers. Mexican girls are taken on dates by wealthy men who promise them new lives in the US, only to be smuggled in as illegal immigrants and forced to work as prostitutes.

There is an urgent need for all countries to decisively address the trafficking problem. The relatively low risk being caught provide a huge incentive for traffickers to carry on their trade; particularly when there is such a lot of money to be made. That needs to change. Fortunately, many countries are starting to respond. As well as requiring states to enact laws criminalizing human trafficking, the UN Protocol calls on states to take action to protect victims of trafficking. It suggests that they should consider providing appropriate housing, medical and psychological treatment, counseling and legal advice. Too often, victims of trafficking are treated as illegal aliens deported summarily. Not only does this fail to recognize the hugely traumatic and dehumanizing experience of these women, but it means that valuable evidence which could help punish their employers is gone. Once back in their villages, victims of trafficking, may find themselves rejected by their former neighbours, and they will once again be vulnerable to traffickers. Many states have changed their laws. Italy established a witness protection program which included a six-month visa and counseling for the women, which has seen prosecutions increase fourfold; while the US has unveiled a temporary "T-visa" which allows victims to stay and assist in legal proceedings.

As long as there are inequalities in the world and people who are unscrupulous enough to exploit them, it's hard to see that trafficking will end completely. But governments can do much to increase the chances that traffickers will be caught and, by helping their victims, make sure that they are convicted. To do that, they need to enact legislations that criminalises traffickers, not victims, and make sure that it is enforced properly. There also need to be co-operation on an international level to enable networks to be properly dismantled. The trade in human lives is one of the biggest assaults to human dignity in the world today. It must not be allowed to continue.
